#### What are you most proud of?



#### Interview with one of our newest members

ROC Players is so fortunate to be full of talented individuals that all share a passion for theater. Below you will find an interview with Oren Schwartz '25, a new member excited to be joining us for his first time with the club.

#### Tell us a bit about yourself.

"My name is Oren Schwartz. I am still working on picking a major, maybe digital studies, social psychology or business. I am from Cheltenham, Pennsylvania, which is right outside of Philly. (Go Philly!)"

#### Why did you join ROC Players?

"First semester I was not involved in any groups and it felt weird. I told myself that in the second semester I would buckle down and join a bunch of clubs. I did theater in high school and ROC Players was a club that always stood out to me. I saw their production of "Falsettos" and said "Ok, this is the club for me.' I was excited to join because it seemed like such a fun, friendly group that had the exact vibes I was looking for in a college club."

#### Tell me about your part in the show

Each line has much more depth, because even if you don't know it yet, every line connects to something later in the show."

#### What has been your favorite part so far?

"Getting to meet all these new people, they are just all so great. It is really fun to bond when you do a show with people, I feel like you really form a strong connection with them. I think there really is no better way to meet people than to rehearse with them and so going through the rehearsal process with them has been an amazing experience for me."

Is there anything about ROC Players that you are looking forward to in the future?

"I'm looking forward to participating in the years to come. I am really glad I joined freshman year because it means I can be more involved in the future!"
